All aspects of sports medicine are cared for by our service—sports medicine/arthroscopy, trauma, and arthroplasty. In addition, our fellows stay on top of sports medicine procedures to broaden their scope of practice and enhance their competitive hiring potential. Furthermore, both basic science and clinical research opportunities have been incorporated into the fellowship allowing our fellows opportunity to become academic experts.

Our fellows are sought after for academic, “privademic,” and private practice depending on their personal goals and preferences. The Columbia legacy, coupled with the current state-of-the-art training from recognized leaders in the field, gives our fellows a distinct advantage in the ever-competitive field of orthopedic sports medicine. Program Overview



The Columbia Sports Medicine Fellowship has its roots in the Shoulder and Elbow Fellowship started by Dr. Charles S. Neer, II in 1977. Since then, the fellowship has trained numerous national and international leaders in the field of shoulder and elbow surgery. Beginning in 2001, with the addition of a sports medicine focus, ours was the only Shoulder and Elbow Fellowship to be ACGME accredited in Sport Medicine, allowing our two fellows the unique opportunity to take the Subspecialty Certification (SSC) in Sports Medicine at the end of their fellowship. As our department has grown, so too has our complement of orthopedic sports medicine specialists. Beginning with the 2018-19 academic year, we have transitioned one of our fellows to the Orthopedic Sports Medicine match—serving side-by-side with the shoulder & elbow fellow.

Operative experience for the sports medicine fellow includes advanced knee, hip, shoulder and elbow arthroscopy in the adult and pediatric sports medicine populations. Additionally, open shoulder experience will be available. This extensive arthroscopy core curriculum experience is enhanced by a state-of-the-art four-station arthroscopy laboratory, ensuring fellows ongoing education and development of surgical techniques.

In addition, the fellowship develops team physicians with team coverage experiences ranging from high school to professional athletics. Emphasis is placed on developing a well-rounded team doctor capable of handling orthopedic issues and primary care conditions in the training room.

The sports medicine fellow dedicates one full day per week to academic pursuits. They may participate in clinical and translational research in the Dr. Robert E. Carroll and Jane Chace Carroll Laboratories led by Stavros Thomopoulos, PhD. Fellows are also invited to assist in the preparation of invited manuscripts, book chapters, and on-line projects. Former shoulder and elbow fellows have garnered international acclaim, and we anticipate the same success for our future sports fellows.

Sports Medicine Clinical Rotation Goals

Weekly didactic lectures covering comprehensive aspects of primary care and orthopedic sports medicine are integrated into an organized conference schedule by the Orthopedic Sports Medicine fellows and the Sports Medicine staff. Developing lecture preparation and presentation skills is essential to fellows seeking both academic and private practice careers. Topics follow athletic seasons to complement fellows' game coverage responsibilities. Lectures include cases to allow fellows to apply practical knowledge, and controversial and/or emerging concepts are discussed openly. The result is a tremendous academic foundation for the sports medicine fellow.

Fellowship Curriculum

Surgical Techniques Conference

Surgical Techniques conference is a tremendous learning experience for optimizing surgical technique and takes place every Friday morning in the Carroll Conference room. The conference entails a sports medicine fellow or sports service resident presenting a recorded surgical procedure step-by-step. Each step is analyzed by attending staff for effectiveness, efficiency, and "what if" scenarios. Past fellows often say this was one of the strongest learning experiences for surgical skill development.

Sports Medicine Arthroscopy & Technical Skills

Columbia's Sports Medicine fellowship education curriculum not only relies on operative and didactic modalities, but also emphasizes a focused arthroscopy curriculum to complement the rotation schedule. The attendings for each rotation serve as instructors for the skills lab training.

Academic & Research Experience



Research is a critical part of the Sports Medicine Service mission. Fellows build upon their existing research skills with extensive exposure to methodology, study design, and critical data review. Each fellow is expected to complete three original research projects (Basic Science or Clinical Research) that are appropriate for publication in a peer-reviewed journal. One of these projects will be presented at the fellow's end-of-year Ground Rounds. There are numerous additional research opportunities including invited review articles, book chapters, and technique videos.

Fellows are given one half-day per week for research monitored via bi-weekly research meetings with the entire sports medicine faculty and research staff. These meetings allow the fellow to improve scientific presentation skills and to receive constructive criticism of their projects. Fellows have access to departmental facilities and research resources.
